So, with a blessing of good weather and expertise of Dennis Huotari and his crews we had our dedication on September 16, 2023!

AT THE LOUIS A. KOENIG RESEARCH CENTER

The past year has been a shared focus of the museum operations AND the work of fundraising and planning for the construction of the Louis A. Koenig Research Center. While each of the Board members were involved to varying degrees, keeping us focused on the finish line was our President, Etola Foytek, who firmly oversaw our goal of getting us to September 16. Quietly, behind the scenes our Secretary/Treasurer, Lorraine Pilch applied her years of management and financial skills during her career in public service to management of finances. Lorraine also worked closely with Carol Koenig to insure communication on building plans and progress. Two guys who also worked closely together have been Tom Kaiser and Dennis Huotari, of Huotari Construction, Medford, WI. Tom is a PCHS Board Member who is our Project Manager for the Koenig building. During the "offseason" Tom maintained a weekly communication with Dennis. PCHS is extremely fortunate to have employed Dennis for this project—his expert professionalism and commitment to quality work guaranteed that the Louis A. Koenig Research Center is a well-constructed and handsome structure that enhances the museum campus at Fifield. The official groundbreaking occurred on November 1, 2022. By November 12, Huotari crews had poured footings, covered them with heavy tarps and then Ol'Man Winter settled in for good, halting all activity until spring. Winter teased Dennis Huotari and his crews with some big snowstorms that delayed the start of serious work until April 22; cement block was delivered on the 24th and work began in earnest. By mid-July there was a complete building structure in place, awaiting the finishing work by the trades crews. Things got a little tense a month later waiting for the con-

crete floor to cure so that the flooring could be laid. Final installation of the floor was done on September 12. Whew! And all of a sudden we found ourselves at September 13—we had to move in and get the place looking like a working archive. Here is where the rest of us stepped up and put the muscle needed for moving all the furniture and some of the collection materials to the Koenig Center. With the assistance from members of the Phillips High School Loggers Basketball Team and their Coach, Amy Ring and Amy's husband Tyler, the heavy, large vertical and horizontal file cabinets were moved to the Koenig Center on Wednesday afternoon. An absolutely monu-

mental task! Thursday was all hands on deck as we organized the furniture and materials we had on hand so the visiting public would get an idea of how the Koenig Center would look and operate. Friday was more of the same—cleaning the Old Town Hall and Greenfield School and last minute touch-ups at the Koenig Center. The crew from Pak Falls True Value Hardware came in and unloaded 100 chairs and set up the big tent on Pine Street directly in front of the Koenig Center.

By Friday evening it looked like we had a campus we could be proud of for Saturday's big event. Saturday morning dawned early and by 10 a.m. Carol Koenig, her brother Stephen and wife Cathy, nephew Craig Koenig, niece Sarah Koenig Standfield and Carol's cousin Richard Kramer and wife Kaye along with other family members gathered at the Koenig family plot at Forest Home Cemetery in Fifield for a memorial service conducted by Fr. Shaji Joseph Pazhukkathara, of St. Anthony's Catholic Church in Park Falls and St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church in Fifield. Meanwhile at the Koenig Center—Board members arrived to set up 100 folding chairs, do last minute cleaning in the Old Town Hall Museum, set up refreshments inside the Koenig Center, assemble the public address system and table by the tent and place floral arrangements provided by Traci Dunbar and Etola Foytek, which provided a colorful and inviting accent to the buildings. We opened

the museums for visitors at 11 a.m. and by noon there was a sizeable crowd gathering. The weather was cooperating with beautiful sunshine playing hide and seek with big, white puffy clouds driven by a refreshing breeze—shaping up to be a beautiful autumn day in Price County! As emcee, I started the

presentation at 1 p.m. by introducing Father Shaji for an Invocation. After presenting a historical perspective, I then turned it over to Etola Foytek, President of the Price County Historical Society for her welcome. Tom Kaiser was up next and gave a concise overview of the project, followed by Alan Barkstrom, Chairman of the Price County Board of Supervisors and Bill Felch, Chairman, Town of Fifield, who offered their insights into the importance of the Koenig Center. Louis A. Koenig's daughter, Carol Koenig, then spoke to the importance of legacy both for her parents as well as preserving history. Dr. Craig S. Koenig, Louis' grandson offered some remarks, and then we proceeded to the ribbon cutting. Dr. Koenig cut the ribbon while Board Member Bonnie Salm joined Tom and Etola in holding the ribbon. Father Shaji offered a benediction and just like that the Louis A. Koenig Research Center was dedicated. It was very satisfying to see that over 100 people attended and spent a good part of the afternoon touring the buildings and taking time to visit. The dedication was a celebration of success! The next big job looming on the horizon was moving all our collections from storage into the new facilities.

By the first week of October we completed our move from the room loaned to us by BW Papersystems in Phillips, and throughout the month continued to move materials from our rented room at the Price County Courthouse in Phillips. During the winter months the board will be involved in the organization of cataloging and labeling our collections and administrative documents in the various filing cabinets and shelves, developing a user's index to accessioning those items and continuing the work of digitizing photographs. Our next big project, a "way cool" venture begun this fall, is construction of the donor wall recognition signage, which is being constructed by Logger Manufacturing as part of the Tech Ed class at Phillips High School taught by Troy Makovsky. The group of students constructing the donor wall are Arlo Berens, Logan Lontcoski, Kaelyb Yasitis and Charlie Cummings. Once the donor board is completed it will hang at the Koenig Center. This project directly involves our younger residents of Price County in helping preserve the legacy of our gracious donors who made this project a success.

Some of our photographs in the PCHS collection will be appearing on the website of the Northern Wisconsin Heritage Council. Spearheaded by Jim Bokern, at the Manitowish Waters Historical Society. I usually give you an update on the administrative functions of the Society, plans for future publications of books and discussion of minutes, agendas, finances and election ballots. While all of that is important, I want to take you back in time a bit to 1959 and an article from the Prentice News section of the Phillips Bee. September 10, 1959 "We should not wait any longer to form a historical society that will work toward preserving the history and records of Price county." This is the feeling that many people throughout the county have expressed. Because of this interest, Vernon C. Hendrickson, of the county extension office, has been making preliminary arrangements for a public meeting of everyone interested in such an organization. A tentative date for early October is expected. Price County has a rich and interesting history. There are many people in the area who still remember this early development, and who could aid greatly in developing a historical society that would preserve these early articles, pictures, and records that would be of tremendous interest to many generations to come. Anyone who is interested might drop a card to County Agent Milo V. Johansen, who will carry on with this work after Mr. Hendrickson leaves for graduate school at the University of Wisconsin." The future meeting did indeed take place as referenced in an article in the Phillips Bee. "A group of interested citizens of Price county met at the Normal building Wednesday, evening, Oct. 7, to learn more about the work of the state historical society and the possibilities of organizing a local unit in Price county. The moving of the log cabin school from the town of Catawba to the county fair grounds has perhaps been the stimulating event that has brought about this new interest in the development of a local historical society." An article in the February 18, 1959 Phillips Bee further explains the role that moving the log cabin school known as the Woodland (Ohrstrom) school played in the idea of forming a historical society. "According to Milo Johansen, county agent, it was the lack of recorded information about the school at the time it was moved from the Ohrstrom land to the county fair grounds in 1957, that caused Vernon Hendrickson and him to become historically minded. They realized how little of Price county history has been recorded and how important it is that

a historical society be organized. Initial plans were made in 1959 which gave birth to the Price county historical society." Once the historical society was formed it became incorporated on November 27, 1959 and 11 directors elected. They were Mrs. George Anderson, Prentice, Miss Mae Nelson and Mrs. Earle Northrup, Park Falls, William Spearbreaker, Fifield, Arthur Johnson, Spirit, Elsie Liebelt, Bernard Zacharias, Milo Johansen, Arthur Beijers, Emma Walter and James Slowey, Phillips. The first officers were Miss Mae Nelson, president, Mrs. George Anderson, vice president, Emma Walter, secretary, Elsie Liebelt, treasurer and Mrs. Earle Northrup publicity chairman. Dues were set at \$1.00 per year and Milo Johansen became the membership chairman.

It is inspiring and humbling to realize that a one-room school finished in 1887, (still with us today at the Price County Fairgrounds) rooted in a deep desire of families of Swedish immigrants to educate their children, became the catalyst for the formation of the Price County Historical Society. We indeed stand on the shoulders of those that came before us. It is with that knowledge and deep gratitude that the Board of Directors of the Price County Historical Society continues our quest to do our best to preserve the history of Price County and pass that desire on to future generations to do the same.

Treasurers Report: Current Financial Report as of the end of the third quarter, September 30, 2022 (included in newsletter). Income total: \$150,443.03; Expense Total: \$14,983.45. Cash on hand (checking and savings): \$302,110.39. Fundraising for the Louis A. Koenig Research Center will continue for the rest of this year and into 2023. Motion made to accept the Treasurer's report (subject to audit). Baumgartner/Gibeaut Carried.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Buildings and Grounds: Kaiser—General Projects Completed: Inspection of all buildings and grounds. Cintas did yearly testing of all fire extinguishers and exit lights in all buildings. All buildings passed inspection. Plunkett's Pest Control maintained quarterly services for rodent control and yearly spraying of all buildings. Ted Fleming has drained water this fall and added antifreeze as needed. Old Town Hall: A couple of windows may need replacing. Electrical mast was re-secured. Old Office Building: Working with Xcel to eliminate gas line and meter. Greenfield School: Furnace inspected and is in good shape. Exterior east wall was painted. Louis A. Koenig Research Center: Groundbreaking held November 1. Numerous contractor meetings with our Board of Directors and Kaiser as Project Manager with our general contractor Dennis Huotari, Huotari Construction, Inc. The expectation is that the building will be completed in the summer of 2023. Grounds: Flowerbed under the museum sign by the OTH was removed and will be left as grass. Flag pole by OTH was painted. Bricks from recent sale are being stored at GFS and will be installed in the brick plaza in spring.

Newsletter: Berg—Reviewed the editorial and publishing process and invited individuals to contact him regarding stories they may like to submit or newsletter ideas. Beginning in 2023 Berg plans to reformat the newsletter in order to create better organization and a better flow of information throughout the newsletter.

Photographs: Dunbar—Foytek, Dunbar and Tollefson continue to meet every Tuesday to work on photographs and archives. A big project will be packing up the room and moving to the research center.

Fundraisers/Events: Foytek—The pie social and strawberry shortcake fundraisers were held and both were well attended. Special openings of the museums, with tours were conducted for the Lakeland Genealogical Society and students from the Butternut School District.

Displays: Foytek/McFadyen/Dunbar—The museums hours returned to normal and were opened full weekends in 2022. The First National Bank display was completed and additions were made to the General Store displays. Plans are to eventually change out the display on the stage in 2023.

Website/Facebook: Pilch—Updates were done as needed by Tollefson and Bill Nemec of Minding Your Business. The facebook site continues to be managed by Steven Eitrem. These sites along with other community facebook sites and both the Phillips and Park Falls Chambers of Commerce are used to promote PCHS and their events

Books: Pilch—Books are sold through our website, gift shop at the OTH, Johnson's Hardware Store, CSA Gallery and Gifts, and the Park Falls and Phillips Chambers. Books republished or published this year were: Thanks to the efforts of Dale Houdek, Chairman of the Town of Emery, Jeanne Kirchmeyer and Violet Dunbar, Members of the Town of Emery Centennial Committee and the entire Town Board of Emery, the copyright to the Emery Centennial 1889-1989 book was transferred to the Price County Historical Society and republished. Thank you to Kathy Cervenka for her donation of 25 Books from Babi's Kitchen Collected Recipes & Stories of the Frantisek and Josephine Machovec Family, with proceeds to go to building the research center. Also republished was A Pictorial History of Park Falls, Fifield and Butternut. Purchased to sell: Hicks' Landing 40th Anniversary Collection of Fine Recipes Vol 1 Edition II as republished by Connie G. Hicks as a 70th Anniversary Commemorative marking the Anniversary of Hicks' Landing (all profits from the sale are earmarked for the preservation of history). Finding Dairyland: In Search of Wisconsin's Vanishing Heritage by Scott Wittman, two books by author Scott Schmidt, Lines from Upstream Volume I and II, and The Art of Fred Smith. The Society is presently working on obtaining the copyright for the Phillips Centennial Book, with plans to republish that along with F.W. Sackett's A Glimpse at the Early History of the State of Wisconsin Relating to Price County, with an addendum first person account by John E. Herron The Early Days of Phillips.

New Business: Election of Directors for three year terms 01-01-2023-12-31-2025: Foytek – Terms for Berg, Dahlie and Tollefson are expiring. All have agreed to serve another three year term. Therefore, it is the recommendation of the Board that this slate be elected as described above. Foytek called three times for nominations from the floor. Motion made by Schmidt, second by Kaiser to close nominations and to cast a unanimous ballot for the slate of directors as presented by the Board. Motion Carried. In addition 34 proxy ballots were received with the following results: Berg=34 votes; Dahlie=33 votes; Tollefson=34 votes; other=0 votes.

Open Forum: Therese Trojak inquired if we were going to publish any of the other towns' centennial books. PCHS indicated that they would be open to that if a good copy of the book can be obtained and the copyright transferred to PCHS. Brayton gave updates on the activities of the Jump River Valley Historical Society. Baumgartner gave updates on the activities of the Spirit Historical Society and the Price County Genealogical Society. Foytek gave updates on the Friends of Fred Smith. Berg discussed his networking with the Upper Flambeau Watershed group, and our membership in the newly formed group Northern Wisconsin Heritage Council, a new group formed to promote and market the history and sites of northern Wisconsin.

Adjournment: President Foytek adjourned the meeting at 9:18 p.m.
